## Weekly shop

### Food has helped Mikma grow healthy and strong

This is Mikma, sitting on the steps of Dolpa Home, Kathmandu, enjoying a meal with her Dolpa “brothers”, Wangla and John Pinjok. This happy picture of children eating food together tells a very different story to the photo of Mikma when she arrived at Dolpa Home three years ago.

Mikma was born in a remote village and was brought to Dolpa as her elderly grandmother was too frail to care for her. Her parents had divorced, her mother moved away and her father was dying of throat cancer.

Mikma arrived a very scared little girl and clearly underweight.



Amos and Doma, houseparents of Dolpa, have over 10 years' experience of welcoming children into their home and helping them to heal and thrive. Often children struggle with the new diet as food has been so limited and Mikma was no exception.

However, with persistence and love, Mikma has thrived.

She now loves all the food she eats at Dolpa and tries everything! Mikma is described as warm hearted, humble and honest, and is doing really well in school. She loves skipping and singing, and talks about being a nurse when she grows up. Through the loving ministry of Dolpa Home, Mikma has discovered Jesus and loves listening to bible stories and praying openly.

## Help me read

**In early March 2019, Andy Jong, our CEO, visited partners Asha Kiran Society (AKS) in India, meeting with the team and making an extensive tour of their education programme, which Rope has supported since its inception in 2006.**

Over the last 13 years AKS have been delivering primary education to children from 31 Desiya-speaking tribal villages in Koraput and Malkangiri districts. Before the programme began, children from these villages would often drop out of education before they got to secondary school as government schools expected them to learn in languages they did not understand.

AKS's 16 multi-lingual centres fill a gap in educational provision. Children are taught a curriculum which respects their own tribal language and culture. Once reading and writing in their

own language is established the children can progress to learning languages that are taught in government secondary schools. This approach has proved successful! Last year all the children graduating from primary AKS schools secured places at government-run secondary schools. Furthermore AKS have recruited and trained 49 local people from the villages as their teacher workforce, bringing much needed employment to these remote communities.



Andy visited 11 centres, spending time meeting with the children, their teachers and parents. He says;

***“ Having approved the very first Rope grant to support AKS’ pioneering multi-lingual education programme in 2009, it was a tremendous encouragement to see first-hand what has been developed since then. In many years of work in Christian international development, I have rarely seen a programme being delivered that is bringing such just and wholesome change. And in some of the villages small groups of Christians are now meeting together as a result of the way in which the work of AKS has given witness to Christ. ”***

AKS’ innovative approach is based around the design and delivery of its curriculum, ensuring that the tribes’ oral traditions are respected. The curriculum is developed by taking recordings of local stories, songs, poems and sayings. These are then incorporated into the learning, so the content is familiar to the children as they begin to read and write.

## Speak their language

One of the centres Andy visited is based in Bairapada village. This was established because the nearest school for the children was a 5km walk away. Villagers were so keen to have a school that they took it upon themselves to reconstruct a disused government building!



Andy spoke to one of the teachers, Goura, pictured with one of his students. Goura has been teaching for 10 years. He lives a 10 minute walk away from the school in a nearby village. He says he loves working with the children and is most proud that he has been able to help provide education for all children in his community.

There are so many amazing stories which testify to why this programme is so significant in bringing transformation to these communities. However, Abhi's story perhaps sums it up best. Abhi graduated from AKS' Sikrel centre in 2018.

Abhi, pictured below, was the first in his family to study. He is also pictured learning to write by using chalk to draw on the floor of his classroom. He was a very shy boy but studied well and secured a place at the government school after graduating from AKS' Sikrel centre in 2018.



Initially he struggled studying in the state language of Odia, as his mother tongue, Kondh, is entirely different. However, he had been taught the basics of Odia by AKS and though he had difficulty speaking in class he persisted and, to his absolute surprise, came first in his end of year exams! Abhi is so grateful for the education he has received. He says that without the Sikrel centre, education would have been a distant dream for him and many other children from his village!

## Keep me warm

### New clothes and bedding for Wesley and Babu

Wesley, 13, and Babu, 10, came to the Jehovah Jireh home in Palakonda, India in 2016. Their father had died suddenly from a heart attack and their mother, a frail woman, was simply unable to care for them. She pleaded that the children might be taken into the home.

Initially both boys really missed their mum and struggled to cope being so far away from their home. However, houseparents Timothy and Chand-Bibi worked hard to ensure that the boys felt loved and secure, giving them time to spend with their mother as and when she was able to visit.

Three years on, Wesley and Babu love life at the home. There are 33 children at the home, aged 8-18, so there is always someone to play with and both boys have made many friends. Babu is doing well at school and is developing into a natural leader. He has a passion for the environment and is often found using recycled material to make something new. His older brother is strong academically and has a natural gift for maths. He is described as a calm, responsible boy, and loves to play



marbles with the other children. Both boys have come to know Christ as their Saviour. Their father was a Christian and their mother was Hindu, however her visits to see her boys and listen to them sharing their faith has led to her recognising Christ as her Saviour.

One of the highlights of home life for Wesley and Babu is the yearly Christmas shopping expedition! Each year Timothy and Chand-Bibi take the children out to a nearby town to shop and enjoy a meal out together. It is a real treat as all the children get to choose two new sets of clothes, one for Christmas Day and one for New Year's Day.

As the picture shows, Babu loved wearing the clothes he bought last year. His older brother says;

*“ We did not have enough clothes to wear when we arrived at the home, so to be able to choose our own clothes is wonderful! ”*



This year we want Wesley and Babu and all 140 children in our 6 homes in Nepal, India and Bangladesh to get new clothes for Christmas along with warm bedding.

## An advocate for freedom

### A social worker helped Max gain freedom from prison and a future

Max, 15, ran away to Mombasa, Kenya, when his stepmother made home life impossible. His mother died when he was 3 and life became very difficult for Max when he developed a rash over his body in 2014.

A health centre diagnosed him with HIV and though his stepmother initially accepted the diagnosis, her attitude changed and she began denying him food. In 2016, home life was so unbearable that Max left, spending the next few years in a cycle of homelessness, being picked up by the police, being returned home and then returning to the streets of Mombasa.

Our partners, Glad's House, met Max in Likoni Remand Home in March 2018. He had rashes all over his body and chose to live a solitary life within prison. As time went by, he started participating in Glad's House's life skills and football programme. It was through these activities and developing a relationship with Glad's House social workers that Max disclosed his health status. The social work team took Max for a medical test and found a health facility willing to support his treatment. They then shared their report on his case with the Children's Officer in charge, who recommended that Max was released, which the court granted.


Unwilling to return home, Max went to live in a children's home and was able to attend school.

Glad's House reports that Max has progressed really well at school and is a hard working, bright boy who is very well behaved. One of Glad's House social workers recently visited Max. He says;

*“ Max came running towards me in happiness and hugged me, calling out my name. He is very happy, healthy and strong. So different to the boy I met in the prison last year. ”*

Max says;

*“ I am so very happy at the home. Everyone is friendly and they guide and support us with care and respect. We are encouraged in our Christian faith and attend a local church each week. I am much healthier as I can take my drugs regularly and have a good diet. I am working really hard at school and I hope to go to university and study chemical engineering. ”*

## Dress to impress

### Gift a widow with a beautiful sari.

Lakshmi lives in Palakonda, India. When her husband was alive, she depended on his income as a tailor, but now he has passed away she lives with her children and grandchildren. Many women in India, like Lakshmi, depend financially on their husbands. When widowed, they face rejection and destitution as they are discarded by his family and community. For this reason, widowhood in India has been described as “a living death”.

Our partners, Jehovah Jireh Ministries, seek to transform the lives of widows by bringing dignity, providing them with a pension, offering the sense of family that they have lost and helping them to become active members of their communities.

This support has been a huge help to Lakshmi. Her life could not be further from the “living death” many widows endure and she has particularly found community in her church. She came to faith through her uncle many years ago and describes Jesus as “my Saviour and my God”, relishing the opportunity to tell others about Him.

# ACTION FOR WOMEN

## Set me up for success

**Support a woman in Pakistan by helping to provide a basic education and vocational training.**

The Gujjar people are an ethnic agricultural community spread across India, Pakistan and Afghanistan. They are of low caste and suffer from acts of oppression including kidnapping and slavery by more aggressive neighbouring communities. Like many women and girls from this conservative community, Yameen, 28, grew up believing that she had no status and would not gain an education. These women are often described as being “passive, sitting at home and under the total supervision of their husbands”.

Things began to change in 2008, when leaders from our partner organisation Shining Light Community Development Organisation (SLCDO) befriended the elders and religious leaders of her village. SLCDO supports innovative, community-led education, training and development programmes. Fast forward to 2019 and the community boasts of having 5 schools educating 500 children. Girls make up 20% - helping to rescue many from early marriages and early parenthood.



Yasmeen was one of these children, but having completed her 10th grade she was not able to continue as her parents were too impoverished to send her to college. However SLCDO offered her a place on their vocational training, in sewing and tailoring, at their centre in Gilgit. Now she is one of two trainers supported by Rope to bring vocational training and personal development education to 50 women from the Gujjar community through two newly established centres.

Yasmeen is training women in her own community so they too can make a personal contribution to their family's financial status. The course is run over a 12 month period and the women learn in groups, which help to develop mutual support networks and gain an understanding of their value in the world.

As Yasmeen says;

*“ I never dreamed of getting these skills and learning how to train and help other women in my community. I am so very excited about the new centre where I can help others to get out from the life of darkness and dependency. ”*

Yasmeen will be helping 50 women to gain vocational training so they can set themselves up to support their family. Training costs include all sewing equipment and materials on the course and provide each woman with a sewing machine once she graduates!

# ACTION FOR SKILLS

## Crafting an income

**Help vulnerable adults gain skills so they can work independently.**

This is Ramon, from Santo Domingo, Ecuador. He is showing a trainee on our partners' programme how to make paper.

Ramon is intelligent, with plenty of initiative and is developing into a wise and gifted teacher. However, this was not the picture of Ramon when he first came to our partner's training programme in January 2018.

Ramon was born able-bodied and he used to work in a local hotel. A motorbike accident, 16 years ago, tragically left Ramon paralysed from the waist down. His pregnant girlfriend left him and Ramon had to move into his elderly mother's one room flat. They were reliant on her meagre income.



Ramon's story of marginalisation is not unique in Ecuador. It is estimated that 15% of the population are people with disabilities and the huge stigma attached means that there is little or no vocational training or employment available to them, consigning them to a life of poverty. Artisan International established their programme in Ecuador to support people with disabilities to gain training and employment. Their hope is that by displaying their talents, skills and employability, wider society will begin to view people with disabilities differently.

The programme offers training in papermaking, printing techniques and jewellery making. It includes all skills needed so graduates can run their own business. Artisan International offers support to graduates by placing regular orders, guaranteeing regular income as graduates begin to grow their business.



This is exactly what happened to Ramon. He was able to earn enough money to rent a much bigger flat for him, his mother and for his son to stay. In 2019, Jess and Andy, leaders of Artisan International in Ecuador, offered Ramon a position of part-time trainer and driver. Ramon is in charge of a newly purchased and adapted minibus so trainees can be transported to the programme. Ramon is loving his new role and it is hoped that in time he will take on more responsibility - maybe being the leader of the programme!

## Tools for success

Training in welding helps men out of a cycle of drugs and alcohol in South Africa.



At the start of 2019, JP came seeking help from our partners, Change Makers in Roodewaal, South Africa.

Aged 23, JP had alcohol and drug addictions.

He literally knocked on the door of Moriah House asking for help after his father, who also had addiction issues, had died. His father had sought help from a rehab centre, but died of a stroke while still being treated. JP's only comfort was knowing

that his father had come to faith shortly before his death and was desiring that his son also gained treatment.

JP's progress through the programme was not an easy one. A lifetime of drugs and alcohol, in street gangs and spells in and out of prison, had left him a wild child with an uncontrollable temper. One violent incident resulted in him being suspended from the programme for two weeks and only returning after he had committed to a counselling and anger management course. Brendon, one of the staff members, took on mentoring JP and was instrumental in bringing him to faith.

With a heart for Christ, JP became obedient, learning to respect leaders and carry out instructions.

As he came towards the end of the programme, JP took vocational training in welding, which he thoroughly enjoyed. On leaving the programme he went to live with his grandparents, and his brother secured him a job working as a boiler maker at a local company. This is his first ever job and he is immensely thankful to God for leading him to knock at the door of Moriah House!



JP is one of 33 men who are helped each year by our partners to receive healing from their addiction and gain employable skills so they can work.

This year we were able to secure a place at the London Marathon and are delighted to share that Andy Hounsell, the Managing Director of County Financial Ltd, has agreed to run for Rope! County Financial are a Christian Financial Planning business, based in Beaconsfield, who have supported Rope since 2006. Andy shares his excitement below;

**“ It was a privilege to be asked by Rope whether I would consider supporting them by running the 2020 London Marathon. The furthest I have ever run is 13.1 miles, so the prospect of doubling the distance is very daunting! As I regard Rope’s work so highly and we are currently reviewing a health-related project for which to raise funds, I took a step of faith and agreed to the challenge. Knowing that the funds raised will make such a significant difference to so many lives will no doubt help to spur me on around the 26.2 mile course! ”**

## FUND A FARMER CAMPAIGN

We are looking for 5 people to take on a personal fundraising challenge and commit to raise £175 to Fund a Farmer in Uganda. This could be anything from a knit-a-thon to a sponsored jog!

Our partners, Youth Action Uganda (YAU), have worked with internally displaced people since 2003 following the 30 year civil war. The team have helped train and equip groups to farm land effectively and build peaceful communities.

In 2018, Rope and YAU developed the ‘Tithe to Thrive’ scheme to equip farmers to gain more sustainable levels of income. In the past, farmers have struggled to gain a fair wage at market. YAU have now developed 14 farming groups who work together to grow and sell larger quantities of produce and tithe back a portion of their profits to help other farmers get started.



With our partners’ training and support, many have been able to buy livestock, send their children to school, cover medical costs and better sustain themselves and their families.
